

Aristotle's *Metaphysics*

Summer Session A, 2015

Course Description

In this course, we will explore some of the central questions raised in Aristotle's *Metaphysics*. We will begin by looking at Aristotle's account, in the *Categories*, of the things that are, and then turn our attention to substances and qualities. How should we understand the relationship between, for example, Socrates and his weight? If Socrates gains some weight, what makes it the case that he's still Socrates and not a different person? To answer this question, we will have to investigate what makes matter into a particular thing, whether different kinds of objects (say, a chair and a human) have different forms, and how we can individuate two objects of the same kind (so, for example, what is the difference between two chairs, or between Socrates and Plato)? Along the way, we'll study Aristotle's account of species, genus and differentiae; essence; form and matter; and universals and particulars.
